## Know How 2 Go Virtual Classroom to Begin in 2009

All 8<sup>th</sup> graders in the Yale school district are the first to explore the KnowHow2Go website in a class format. Thanks to the collaborative efforts of the Yale Junior High Counselor Shari Muxlow, Annette Maxwell, St. Clair County RESA's Higher Education Consultant and Mara Skinner, EMP teacher, students are on track, planning their high school and college careers.

The students take a quiz about college, meet the tough characters (Algebra II, Biology and Foreign Languages) and take a virtual tour of a college campus to begin putting all the pieces of higher education together.

Below are the four steps students are encouraged to take through the national campaign.

1. **Be a pain**—in a good way. Find an adult who can help you navigate the steps to apply to college. Let everyone know you want to go to college, and don't stop until you find someone who can and will help you.
2. **Push yourself.** Colleges require you to take certain classes in high school. Find out which classes are necessary and sign up. Also, to improve your chances for admission, boost your GPA if needed or sign up to participate in school clubs and activities.
3. **Find the right fit for college.** Think about interests and activities that you enjoy. Explore colleges with programs that suit your interests.
4. **Get your hands on some \$\$\$.** There's money out there to help pay for college. Apply for it! If you need help, ask an adult or a peer who has gone to college.

**CODE OF CONDUCT by Julie Jowett-Lee, YPS Social Worker**

YPS believes in providing a positive, respectful, proactive school environment that encourages all students to learn. Because of this, the District has adopted a Positive Behavior Support System that works in conjunction with the School -Wide Code of Conduct. Acknowledging appropriate behaviors is an integral component in this plan.

Research supports that students respond best to a combination of positive intrinsic and extrinsic rewards, consistent discipline, and knowledge of expectations placed on them all within a safe, structured school environment. Communicating proactively with students and parents is a crucial part of this plan.

YPS District-Wide Plan is a 4-tiered plan beginning with

1. Students / Parents / Guardians
2. Classroom
3. School
4. District
  1. Students – We know that 80% - 90% of our students will respond to the supports and discipline policy. 5% - 15% are students at risk that may require more supports and less than 7% of students will require individual plans to help meet their needs. We work hard to establish rapport with all of our students and to identify and refer the students who may require more support.
  2. Classroom – All teachers work hard to make their classrooms inviting and encouraging places of learning. Individual recognition, support and intermittent intrinsic rewards happen on a daily basis. All classrooms have a four-step discipline plan in place with expectations clearly stated in the classroom.
  3. Schools – promoted throughout the school through student-staff relationships outside of the classroom, displayed messages, all school assemblies, merit activities and individual recognitions. Developing positive behavior support plans for individual students such as SNAC (Student Needs Assessment Committee), ISAP (Individual Student Action Plan), or FBAP / BIP (Functional Behavior Assessment Plan / Behavior Intervention Plan) is another way our schools promote an effective support system. Having a consistent discipline plan and code of conduct beginning in Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade allows students to be confident of the expectations placed on them.
  4. District – It all begins at the top. Administration and Board of Education support makes all of this possible. Adaptability and constantly striving to learn and grow as a District makes Yale Public Schools a leader in promoting positive school environments.

## Transportation News

Bus schedules will be posted on front door windows at respective buildings on August 31, 2009. Please remember bus route pick up times are estimated. Have students at their bus route stop a few minutes early for the first few days of school until the runs settle into an established time pattern.

- Parents/Guardians are responsible for getting their child/children to and from the bus safely.
- Parent/Guardians are also responsible for their child/children while at the bus stop.
- It is important that the parents, as well as the students, know their bus drivers name and their bus route number.
- Please review the Transportation Handbook with your child/children.

**Note:** Children not enrolled in school 2 weeks prior to the start date of Sept. 8, 2009, may not be provided transportation the first week of school. Call the transportation office at 810-387-3010 to arrange transportation for a new student.

### **New for this year:**

**All bus stop changes, due to change of residence, must be requested in writing and approved through the transportation office. Changes may take up to 3 days to implement. Bus Stop Change Request Forms are available at the transportation office, online, and at any of the school offices.**

### **School Closing/Bus Delays Information**

During bad weather conditions, changes in school and bus information are announced on both radio and television. Calls are made to WPHM (1380 AM), WHLS (1450 AM), WSAQ (107 FM), WBTI (96.9 FM), and WMIC (660 AM). Also Channels 2, 4, 7, are notified. Please listen/watch for these school bulletins. On foggy days, buses may run late, but the schools will be open on their regular schedules. You may also call the Transportation Hotline at 810-387-3010 and press 1 for any bus delays or school closing information.

**Reminder:** In the event school is closed or dismissed early it is important that each individual family have an emergency plan or provisions in place for their child/children. Please review these plans/provisions with your child/children periodically and keep them up to date as your personal circumstances change.

It is also important that you keep your child's/children's emergency contact information up to date at the transportation office as well.

As always, please feel free to contact the transportation office if you have any questions. The transportation office opens August 18, 2009. We look forward to working with you so we may provide safe and efficient transportation services for your child/children.

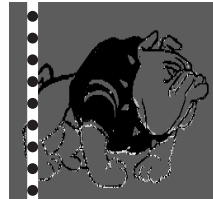
